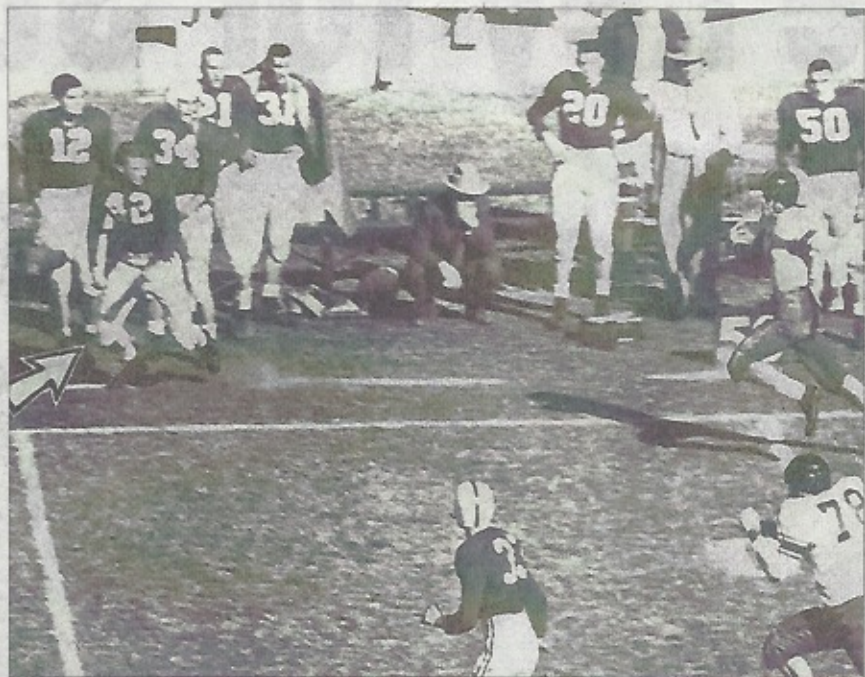

## He was 'full of 'Bama'

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. — Former Alabama player Tommy Lewis, who gained fame for a play when he wasn't supposed to be on the field, died Sunday in a Huntsville retirement home. He was 83.

Mr. Lewis came off the sideline in the 1954 Cotton Bowl and tackled Rice All-American halfback Dicky Maegle near the 50-yard line.

Maegle eluded Bart Starr on a sweep and was on his way to a 95-yard touchdown when Mr. Lewis brought him down. Mr. Lewis ran back to the bench, and Maegle was credited with a touchdown.

Mr. Lewis said of his actions that he "was just too full of Alabama."

The two players appeared on the *Ed Sullivan Show* two days later and Sullivan offered a room for them at the Waldorf-Astoria. Maegle asked for a separate room, telling Sullivan: "He just jumped off the bench to tackle me. I don't know how stable he is. He may have a nightmare and might want to throw me out the window."

**GURLEY STILL OUT:** Georgia star running back Todd Gurley hasn't been cleared to play, but he returned to practice. He remains on indefinite suspension while the school investigates possible violations of NCAA rules.

**BUFFALO FIRES COACH:** Buffalo fired coach Jeff Quinn two days after a loss to Eastern Michigan. Offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Alex Wood was

elevated to interim coach. Quinn, 52, was in his fifth season and was 20-36 overall.

**MARIJUANA SEIZED:** Police seized 112 grams of marijuana and \$4,661 in cash from Alabama tight end Kurt Freitag's dorm room last week, according to a complaint. Freitag reportedly gave West Alabama Narcotics Task Force agents permission to search his room after they saw him making a drug transaction.

**BONG PHOTO:** Mississippi coach Hugh Freeze said he has talked with defensive tackle Robert Nkemdiche about a blurry photo on the Internet that shows a person holding a bong. Freeze would not confirm Nkemdiche was in the photo.

**HAWAII:** Running back Joey Iosefa was arrested on suspicion of drunken driving. According to police records, Iosefa, 23, was taken into custody at about 5 a.m. Sunday near downtown Honolulu.

**INDIANA:** Quarterback Nate Sudfeld will miss the rest of the season after separating his non-throwing shoulder in Saturday's loss at Iowa.

**LOUISVILLE:** Freshman wide receiver Cameron Polk was dismissed from the team after campus police cited him for drug possession.

**N.C. STATE:** Seven players were suspended for this week's game against Louisville for their involvement in a BB gun incident, coach Dave Doeren said. Among them were starting linebacker Jerod Fernandez, the team's leading tackler, and safety Josh Jones.
